Brochos

On shooting stars, comets, earthquakes, lightening, thunder, or strong winds say, "Whose strength fills the word."
For lightning, once a storm suffices.

Upon mountains, hills, seas, rivers, or deserts, and soft winds, the sun in the beginning of its cycle, the moon at the beginning of its cycle, or the sky in perfect clarity (after three days of rain in the rainy season), say, "Who made Creation."

Once a day will suffice.

For rainfall and good tidings, say, "Who is good and does good." One can say this, too, for lower prices, flowing rivers that irrigate land, and an era of plenty.

On bad news say, "The true Judge."
Upon hearing a parent died, "the true Judge."
If he was left an inheritance, then "Good who does Good."

Upon seeing the moon at its renewal, "Who renews the months." This can be said until the day before the full moon. (14th).

Upon passing graves, "Who resurrects the dead."

Upon seeing a rainbow say, "Who remembers the covenant."

Yerushalayim

One who sees Yerushalayim (the old city) for the first time in thirty days, tears kirah in mourning.

Rosh Chodesh

Mussaf Amidah middle brocha ends with "Who sanctifies Yisroel and the first/head of the months."
